The <u>Fulbright Study/Research Award</u> is the traditional award opportunity where a candidate designs a proposal for a specific country. English Teaching Assistant (ETA) Awards

Programs that place grantees in schools overseas to supplement local English language instruction and to provide a native speaker presence in the classrooms. Youi don't have to be an education major or have teaching experience to apply for an ETA and TU has seen the greatest success with ETA applications.

Fulbright-Fogarty Awards in Public Health

The <u>Fulbright-Fogarty Awards</u> are offered through a partnership between the Fulbright Program and the Fogarty International Center of the U.S. National Institutes of Health. These awards were established to promote the expansion of research in public health and clinical research in resource-limited settings. Applicants must be enrolled in graduate or medical school or hold a doctorate at the time of application.



Fulbright-National Geographic Digital Storytelling Fellowship

The <u>Fulbright–National Geographic Digital Storytelling Fellowship</u> provides a unique platform for awardees to develop global narratives and discuss commonalities across borders around a common issue or theme. Trained, supported, and mentored by National Geographic Editors during their grants in one or multiple countries, Fellows will use new media platforms to help build ties across cultures while enhancing mutual understanding. The digital content that they produce will be featured online in various places, including, most prominently, a blog hosted by National Geographic.
